Apostrophes

This is an apostrophe: '.

Apostrophes can be used to show when a letter or letters have been taken out of a word. This is called a **contraction**. So if you want to write I am as I'm, you put in the apostrophe to show where the a is missing and then join the words together.

Apostrophes for possession are used to show that something belongs to someone or something. For example, **the coat belonging to the girl** is written as **the girl**'s **coat**.

Apostrophes for contraction
