Image of God

We're certainly managing to dominate the planet, but it's not obvious that we're doing a great job of looking after it.

It could be that it's our very capacity to make mistakes that makes us unique. After the story of creation comes the story of Adam and Eve. And it was Eve exercising her free will that led to the world's first major muck-up, resulting in mankind falling from grace with God, and leading to a lot of complicated questions...
