Shannon opened her mouth to speak. 'Sir, I tried to tell Miss Peace, but ...'. <u>She broke off as she caught sight of Becky</u> [shows her fear] looking hard at her and, without the Head noticing, drawing her finger slowly across her throat like a knife.

'Well, Shannon ...' The Head shook his head and looked away, then back. <u>'I'm afraid you give me no choice</u>.' *[shows reluctance to punish her]*
