Has the writer used a particular technique?

These words might help:

simile

Why is the writer using that technique?

Do they want to give the reader a better idea of what something is like? Are they trying to tell us something?

These phrases might help:

...to show us that...

...this gives the impression that...

...this suggests that...

...creates an effect of...

Are there any double meanings?

Sometimes, a word can suggest more than one meaning. So, for example, "gravely" can suggest seriousness, but also the grave – it implies death!

What is the effect on the reader?

What do you think the writer is trying to make the reader feel? These words might help:

menace

suspense

sinister atmosphere

fear

anticipation

lighthearted

humour

sympathy

injustice

Remember, be precise!

Never say something is good, bad or nice. Explain how it works, or doesn't work!

Some useful words might be:

effective

appropriate

powerful

significant

What are their word choices?

Sometimes, the writer doesn't use a particular technique, but their word choices are interesting. If you spot an unusual word, think about why you find it interesting.
