

Could you learn to sing Calon Lân in 30 minutes?

Video transcript – Chorus

Everybody loves a big rousing chorus. So, come on. Let's try and nail it!

Look out for the sound **ll** as in *llawn* and *all*.

Now, the way to make the sound **ll** is to place your tongue as if you're going to say **l**, then blow really hard down the sides of your mouth. *Calon lân yn llawn daioni*.

A bit of advice here – the first time you practise this, stand against a surface that you can wipe down easily!

The next line starts with *tecach* in *Tecach yw na'r lili dlos*.

The **ch** in *tecach* is like the **ch** in the word loch. The main thing to remember here though is the more spit, the better!

Dim ond calon lân all ganu – the tongue twister will help with this line if you can remember it. And don't forget the **ll** in *all*. *Dim ond calon lân all ganu*.

And the last line. Well this isn't too tricky – *Canu'r dydd a chanu'r nos*.

Cast your minds back to when you were in school and learning the days of the week in Welsh – **Dydd Llun**, **Dydd Mawrth**, **Dydd Mercher** and so on. And then *nos*, as in **Nos da** – goodnight. *Canu'r dydd a chanu'r nos*.

Now, let's try and practise the whole of the chorus.

Now, if singing that doesn't help Wales win, nothing will!
