Video transcript: Waiting for the aurora

I've returned to Inverness to meet a local Highlander who's had more luck than me spotting the Northern Lights. Barry Stewart is a keen photographer who was surprised by an amazing display when he was in Wick.
BARRY STEWART:

It's very nice to meet you.
BARRY STEWART:
Pleased to meet you too.

Barry you're local to these parts and you've not just seen the Northern lights, you've actually filmed them. How did that come about?

## **BARRY STEWART:**

Well I'm a very keen photographer of the night sky. And this particular night, I just went out with my camera to take a star time lapse and I did see a faint glow low on the horizon. And it turned out green on my camera – so I thought... wow, this is amazing – an unpredicted aurora!

## **BARRY STEWART:**

I've never seen the Northern Lights, you know, so this will be a real treat.

Crumbs, it's incredible. Look at the different colours – we've got orange, pink, yellow, green, blue... and they get deeper. That is amazing.
