Blue tit

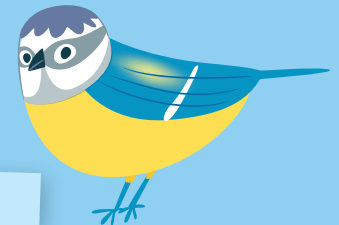

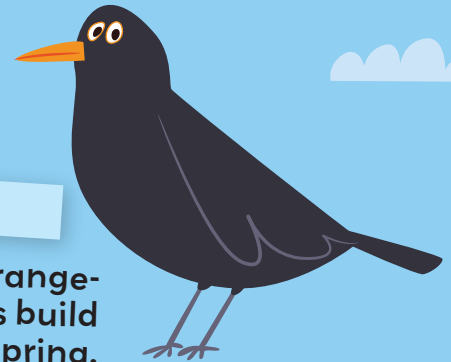
This little bird has a bright red breast and can often be seen hopping about the garden in winter.



Often seen collecting insects, this bird makes sure its young get lots to eat.



In summer, this bird has a yellow beak. It can be seen flying in large flocks called murmurations.



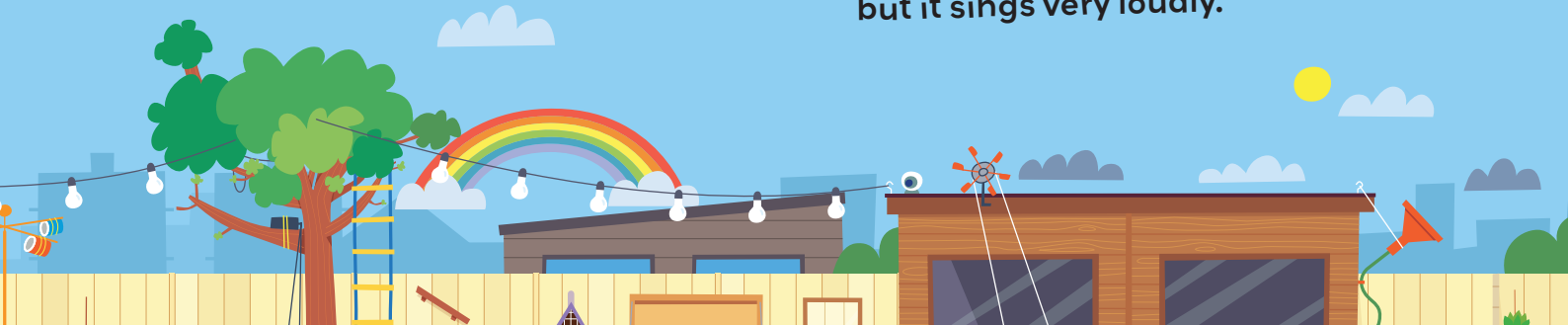
This bird has a bright orange-yellow beak. The females build their nests in spring.



These friendly birds tend to live in small groups, often close to people.



This is one of the UK's smallest birds, but it sings very loudly.



Let's make some garden birds

! When using scissors, make sure you have an adult to help you.

YOU WILL NEED

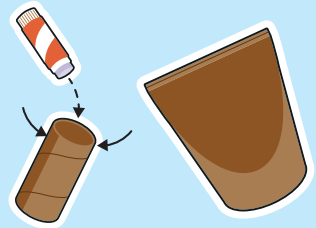
- Cardboard tube
- Paint and brushes or felt tips
- Water pot
- Safety scissors
- Glue stick or sticky tape



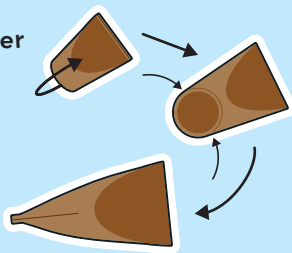
1 Choose a bird you would like to make.



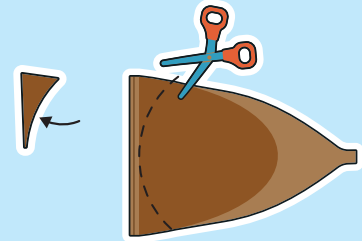
2 Squeeze one end of the cardboard tube and stick it down with glue or sticky tape.



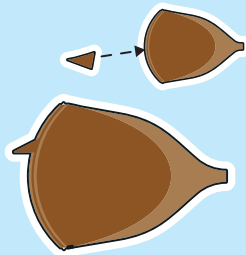
3 Squeeze the other end but **MAKE SURE** you squeeze in the opposite direction (90 degrees).



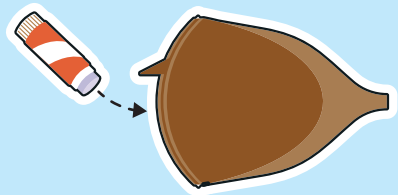
4 Round off the corners of one end of the tube with scissors. Keep one of the corners to use as the beak.



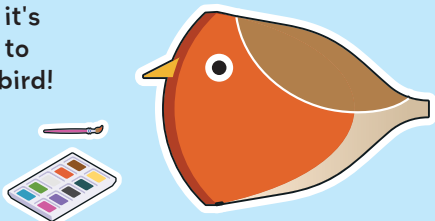
5 Place a small amount of glue on the beak. Then stick it to the inside of the tube on the side with the rounded edges.



6 Now glue that side of the tube to stick it together.



7 Now it's time to paint your bird!



Answers: Page 1:

Winter: 1. Snow falling. 2. Water turned to ice. 3. The tree has no leaves.

Spring: 1. Leaves and flowers start to grow. 2. Birds building nests. 3. Daffodils growing.

Summer: 1. Flowers in full bloom. 2. Sunshine and warm temperatures. 3. Lots of bugs and minibeasts.

Autumn: 1. Leaves turning orange/brown and falling from trees. 2. Flowers dying. 3. Squirrel burying food.
