I want to shake Ra sometimes. Do you realise the real cost of your obsession?

Ok, so you are sat there, going...

'Myra! You're a hypocrite, you have a phone right there!'

I'm not saying never buy anything, never use anything, go give all your possessions away and go live in a field somewhere.

What I am trying to say is the things we buy cost way more than the price on the sticker.

An awareness about the hidden costs helps us make much better decisions about what we need and what we don't need.

See, my phone is very old but it's in good condition and it works perfectly, so it's very simple.

Reflect; do I really need a new phone? - No, I don't.

Resist, buying for the sake of it. If nothing else it saves me a packet.

Reuse; a second-hand phone does just fine and is way cheaper anyway.

Recycle; when I do get rid of my phone I'll make sure it doesn't go to waste.

It works for anything!

So think before you spend your money and if you do decide to buy, do some research.

Try to make decisions based on having as little impact as possible.
