Video transcript: A poet at war

Ifor ap Glyn:

A hundred years after his birth, you'd think that we know Dylan Thomas pretty well by now; but somehow, his genius resists being pushed into pigeonholes.

He was a brilliant poet, gifted writer of short stories and successful radio broadcaster.

He was a raconteur, bohemian, womaniser, and drinker of legendary excess.

But what did he do during the war? He spent most of it scripting propaganda films for the Ministry of Information!
