- What is the first thing at the very **top** of the page?
 The headline
- Does the **first** paragraph give away all the information about the story?
 Why do you think this is?

5. Does the article answer the **5 Ws:** what, when, who, where, why?

Who: The drawings were found by a British-Colombian team, funded by the European Research Council.
Where: In the Amazonian rainforest.
Why: It's not clear why the paintings were drawn, but archaeologists are studying them because they will give us a glimpse into a lost civilisation.

6. What do the following underlined phrases from the article suggest?

The paintings **are believed to be** at least 12,500 years old.

<u>It hasn't been confirmed</u> who made the drawings <u>but some people think</u> they could have been...

These phrases suggest that there are still things that are unknown about this discovery. It's very new and the archaeologists don't know all the facts yet.
