

## DID OH WHAT A LOVELY WAR SHAPE OUR VIEW OF WW1?

## **Video transcript - Introduction**

The musical Oh What a Lovely War opened here in March, 1963. It was produced by The Theatre Workshop, an acting group led by radical director Joan Littlewood.

Under the guise of musical entertainment, Oh What a Lovely War took a satirical look at the conflict of 1914-1918.

The play was staged as a seaside concert party with the cast performing in traditional white Pierrot outfits in place of realistic costumes.

In a series of sketches and songs the show unashamedly favoured the ordinary, working class men who found themselves in the trenches.

Generals were portrayed as buffoons - convinced of their own authority and too stubborn to concede mistakes.

In the show the men at the front suffered continual betrayals.
